According to the Kentucky "Domesday Book" SHS. 21:271:

"1776 Certificate issued for 1000 acres—John Swan, Jr., this day claimed a preempt of 1000 acres of land at the State price in the Dis-trict of Kentucky on account of marking and improving the same in the year 1776, lying on the South Fork of Rolling Fork of Salt River about two or three miles from the mouth of the sald Fork about two miles from where a large Buffaloe Road crosses the Rolling Fork to include his improvement satisfactory proof being made to the Court, they are of the opinion that the sald Swan has a right to a preempt of 1000 acres of land to include the above location and that a certifi-cate be issued accordingly."

NOTE: At the time of filing of the will of John Swan, Lincoln County covered almost a half of southern and western Kentucky. While it would seem that John Swan, Jr., did live in what was then Nelson County, and later became Hardin County, it is likely that copies of the will were filed in both places.—H. L. L.

After the death of John Swan, Jr., his widow married (2) Thomas McNeil. He died leaving two children born of this union. Elizabeth then married, July 7, 1783, John Ventrees, a widower with six chil-dren. He had been a member of Goshen Baptist Church before going to Kentucky. A son was born by this last marriage. John Ventrees died about 1802-03, leaving a will showing that Elizabeth survived him.
