Mrs.O.W.Bolton, Church Leader, Dies at 74

Mrs. Maude Idell Bolton, 74 years, wife of Rev. O. W. Bolton, died suddenly Friday morning, June 1, 1951, in their home on South Cumberland street. She was widely known in this dis-trict for her church and mission-pre work

trict for her church and mission-ary work. Mrs. Bolton was a daughter of Solomon and Minerva Munch and was born March 5, 1877, at Fre-mont, Ohio. She graduated from Adrian College, Adrian, Mich., and for the next year was an in-structor at the Raisin Valley Seminary in Michigan. Later she taught in high schools at Sault Sainte Marie and Tecum-seh, Mich. For 20 years she was a school teacher in Allegheny, Fayette and Washington Coun-ties.

ties. On June 14, 1906, she was united in marriage with Rev. O. W. Bolton and served with him in church work. At the time of their marriage Rev. Bolton was pastor of a church at Hopwood. While Rev. Bolton was pastor of the Monongahela Circuit of the former Methodist Protestant denomination, Mrs. Bolton or-ganized and taught the first or-ganized Bible Class in Greene County, at the Fordyce Methodist Church.



THE HILLER FAMILY Peter Hiller was a member of the Swan-Hughes-Vanmeter Party that came to the Tenmile Country about 1767-68. The Hiller (some-times spelled Heller, etc.) Family seems to have come from Prince George's County, Maryland, where the name is found as early as 1789. No military record is found for Peter Hiller, but he could have served in Captain Jesse Pigman's Company of which there is no record.

record. Peter Hiller died in Greene County, February 8, 1833, when he was 80 years of age. His wife was Agnes _______, who died Decem-ber 8, 1835, at the age of 79 years. Both are bur'd in the old cemetery at Shephard's Church. Peter Hiller lett a will in which he named a son, Peter Hiller, and a daughter, Elizabeth Hiller. (Will Book 2. pp. 17.) A John Hiller, either a son or grandson, was named executor. Orphan Court records disclose that William Hiller was another son, who shared in the estate. (O. C. Docket 2. pp. 17.)

THE THOMAS FAMILY

One branch of the Thomas Family of the Tenmile Country is descended from Ellis Thomas, a native of Frederick County, Virginia, who made his will August 4, 1760, which was probated at Winchester, on October 4, 1763. His wife was Elizabeth — who survived him. He could be the Ellis Thomas, mentioned in Kerchaval's "History of the Valley" as having been killed by the Indians, and his wife miraculously saved. (pp. 100.)

First Museum Of Pa. Fauna Established By Prof. Augey




