The U. S. Eighth Army disclosed that while Tuesday's fifth session was in progress Allied tanks and soldiers drove inside Red lines northeast of Kaesong. The probing forces punched hard at Red troop concentrations near the Kaesong five-mile neutral zone.

Although there has been no official report other than that the first five meetings were congenial with "some progress" made, it is generally believed that the question of withdrawal of U. N. troops from Korea is holding up agreement on an aggenda.

DAVID DUNCAN

David Duncan was a native of Cumberland County, Pennsylvania before removing to Westmoreland County, where he was an important Indian Trader during the early days of the Revolution. He had been taken prisoner during Dunmore's War and escaped the danger of death through the intercession of Chief White Eyes. For three months beginning May 1, 1778, he was a Captain of 52 officers and men under General Hand, his junior officers being John Bradley and Robert McKinley. (Draper Mss 3NN-8.) While living in Westmoreland County, he was a popinted Assistant Commissary General, probably through the influence of his Cumberland County, leighbor, Ephraim Blaine, who served as Commissioner of Purchases for Westmoreland County. (Penns Arch. Series VI Vol. 2. pp. 261.) When General Brodhead was called up for court martial and forced to give up his post at Fort Pitt, David Duncan also came under censure for his part in the dealings in the supply department, being accused and apparently not unjustly, of furthering his own financial position.

During his stay in the district he had plenty of opportunity to become acquainted with the land in the Muddy Creek Section, and he became the patentee of a number of tracts including "Plenty," "Felicity," and "Content," tracts that were at the present village of Khedive, for which he obtained a warrant in 1786, having obtained them through a Virginia Certificate. These tracts which he probably owned at a much earlier date than his warrant shows, were close to the land mentioned as having been improved in the Summer of 1766, by Josias Crawford. General Brodhead reports sending him down here for gathering of supplies for the garrison at Fort Pitt and not always with success. He also helped gather recruits in the district for the Eighth Pennsylvania Regiment, which fought at Saratoga, Brandywine, and Germantown, in which regiment his discharge, Mr. Corbett completed his education at the University of Pittsburgh, graduating with a Bachlement his son-in-law, John Finley, served as a Captain.



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

Nutrition of any portion of the human body depends on adequate circulation in the flow of blood. When the circulation become reduced below a certain level the tissues die and gangrene de-velops.

tissues die and gangrene develops.

This is particularly true of circulation in arms and legs.

Whenever a foot or hand becomes cold and numb and remains so, it may be due to loss of necessary circulation.

The natural desire of the person so affected is to rub the limb vigorously or to bathe it in hot water.

Either of these restures may

Either of these gestures may damage the hand or foot be-cause diminished circulation has made the limb easily susceptible

made the limb easily susceptible to injury.

Interruption of blood flow may result from any one of a number of conditions.

An injury may tear apart or damage an artery to the point that it becomes plugged with a clot.

that it becomes plugged with a clot.

In hardening of the arteries, the lining may become rough and may have on it a clot which increases in size until it prevents blood flow.

Or, a clot may develop inside the heart due to heart disease, become dislodged and travel down the main arterial passageways until it reaches a point where it completely plugs the artery.
