The tax levy was fixed at one and one-half mills on gross receipts derived from all services to clients, patients and customers during the preceding year.

Those affected by the ordinance must register on or before January 1, 1952. A return is to be made on or before March 15, 1952, and the tax will be due on that date for the year 1951. Evasion of the tax will be due on that date for the year 1951. Evasion of the tax will be punishable by a fine of \$100.

Persons who commence business during the tax year will file a return will be confidential.

Persons who commence business the entire year of 1951 will compute their tax by multiplying gross receipts during the first month in business by the following first day of January.

The tax covers any individual, partnership, limited partnership, association or corporation, except wage earners, non profit religious, charitable or educational groups.

The vendor's ordinance becomes effective December 1, and will not apply to sellers of milk, dairy or farm products, and will not interfere with resident business effective December 1, and will not apply to sellers of milk, dairy or farm products, and will not interfere with resident business meen, peddlers, hawkers, itinerant merchants and transient vendors and declare as a nuisance those who enter upon private residences without being so requested. Violations are punishable with \$100 fine or 30 days in jail.

500 Millions For Road Aid

The Bureau of Public Roads has divided 500 million dollars in Federal aid to the states for highway construction in the year beginning July 1, 1952.

Primary highway systems in the states will get the largest portion of the fund—225 million dollars — while secondary road projects will receive 150 millions and the remaining 125 millions will go for highways in urban areas.

Since the Federal funds will be matched by the states, at least one billion dollars would normally be spent on highway construction and improvement of old roads during the next fiscal year.

probably the father of Margaret, recorded a gift of a dark bay mare to James Hook, son of James Hook, Sr. (DB. Libra M. pp. 174 Upper Marlboro.) The inventory of Benjamin Thrasher's estate was signed May 18, 1741, by John Jackson and Ninian Beale. James Lee and Mary Lee were listed as near relatives. James Hook died in 1738.

John Hook, son of James and Margaret (Thrasher) Hook, was born about 1718, in Prince George County, and died in Lower Frederick County, Maryland, in 1762. He married, probably, Sarah Simpson, though there is a suggestion of doubt about her last name and there are some who think she may have been Sarah Snowden, a family that seems closely connected in some unknown way. After the death of his father, John Hook, with his brother, James Hook, he removed to Lower Frederick County, where they settled on a tract of 150 acres of land conveyed to James Hook by a deed of gift August 26, 1740, by John Magruder. Then James Hook gave, on November 27, 1740, fifty acres of this land to his "loving brother," John Hook, John Hook accumulated other tracts of land, and then on January 16, 1752, John Hook and wife, Sarah, sold at tract of 133 acres to Richard Ankrom (Ankrum) a deed that was repeated a year later with slightly different wording. The will of John Hook was made May 19, 1761, and filed in Frederick County, December 4, 1761. His wife, Sarah, apparently survived him and he mentions two sons, James Hook and John Snowden Hook. (Libra A-1. pp. 170.)

CAPTAIN JAMES HOOK

Captain James Hook, son of John and Sarah Hook, was born in Lower Frederick County, Maryland, about 1749, a date determined from information given in his pension claim. Family traditions say he removed to the Tenmile about 1772, but his name is not found in the Springhill Township, Bedford County, tax lists for that year. He made three deeds of conveyance in Frederick County during the period from 1771 to 1775. One of these was dated August 20, 1771, another on April 10, 1775, and the last on June 17, 1775, which disposed of the property received by the will of his father. He settled on land which by deed of March 1, 1780, he purchased from David Owens, and which was patented to James Hook on May 13, 1789, under the title of "Hook's Delight." This land was on Owens' Run and had been granted to David Owens by virtue of a Virginia Certificate. His wife, Mary, who had joined in the deeds of 1771 and 1775, and at least a son and daughter accompanied him to the Tenmile Country. Mr. James W. Hook has confirmed the fact that Mary, wife of James Hook, was Mary Leith, (also spelled Lyeth, Lieth, etc.) a daughter of Robert and Sarah (Lakin) Leith. Sarah Lakin was a daughter of Abraham Lakin, who married, October 10, 1717, Martha Lee, born June 20, 1699, daughter of William and Ann Lee of Prince George's County, Maryland. Robert Leith was of Ann Arundel County, Maryland. Mary (Leith) Hook died in Greene County, Pennsylvania. In 1902 Mr. Charles Kent of Waynesburg, reported that he had found an old grave some four miles East of Waynesburg, on which was carved, "Here lies the body of Mary Hook, wife of James Hook, who dep, this life Jan. 30, A. D. 1815 aged 71 years, 4 months, and 19 days." Mr. James W. Hook states he saw this stone in 1923, when it was all but obliterated.

History Silent On Lost Colony

"There was considerable excitement in Philadelphia in October 1737, over the visit of Sheik Sedi, a Christian nobleman from Syria, who came to Pennsylvania to look for a site for a colony for his co-religionists, who were victims of oppression by the Turks," Shoemaker said.

"This proposed colony was to include Armenians, Assyrians, Druses and other Turk-oppressed peoples from the Near East.

"The Shiek told his admirers that he had heard Pennsylvania described as a wonderful land of religious tolerance and thought that a new Armenia or new Assyria might be established in this colony of the new world. He preferred, he said, a site containing mountains and evergreen forests similar to the habitat his refugees were familiar with in their homeland.
