## FAMILY OF CAPTAIN JAMES AND MARY (LEITH) HOOK

1. John Hook, born in Frederick County, Maryland, July 4, 1766, died near Augusta, Bracken County, Kentucky, January 9, 1850; married, about 1784, Hannah Morris, born January 4, 1767, probably in Ireland, died April 14, 1838. The wedding was objected to by John's parents, so the young couple left after their marriage and settled on a farm near Augusta, Bracken County, Kentucky. (We are of the opinion that John Hook may have joined the migration to this place, which included Richard Jackson, James and Samuel Mirandy, Sebastian Schroeffer, John Fee, Leonard Sellars and others from the vicinity of Fort Jackson. This migration took place close to 1789.) In Kentucky, John Hook amassed considerable estate, including 40 slaves, whom John, before his death, distributed among his children, except Rebecca, who refused and took money instead. Old family documents, including the Family Bible, give the vital statistics on 11 children. Mention is also made of certain of John Hook's brothers and sisters. Record secured by James W. Hook in 1931.

### Children of John and Hannah (Morris) Hook

- Mary Hook, born March 27, 1785, married Samuel Poe.
- Rebecca Hook, born December 21, 1788, died July 27, 1855; married, October 18, 1810, John Marsh, born August 6, 1789, died April 29, 1827. They settled near Laurel, Ohio.
- James Hook, born January 16, 1790, died August 1, 1813, leaving a wife and five children.
- Sarah Hook, born March 11, 1792, died January 1, 1860; married, May 5, 1825, John Taylor, born November 18, 1799, died March 30, 1887.

- Hannah Hook, born July 17, 1799, married Solomon Taylor.
- Samuel Hook.
- Elizabeth Hook, born October 13, 1803, died June 14, 1880; married Daniel Byers.
- Stephen Hook, born May 12, 1806, died January 21, 1874; married Nancy Heck.
- Martha Hook, died young.
- Isreal Hook, his wife was Mary, lived in Waynesburg as late as 1824. He visited his brother, Stephen Hook, in Perry County, Ohio, in 1845. Said to have lived in Kentucky many years.
- Sarah Hook, born 1770, died 1826; married Barnet Rinehart, born September 8, 1777, died January 2, 1843. He was a son of Simon and Sarah Rinehart, and had been left an orphan, when the Indians killed his father about 1779-80. He is mentioned in the will of his grandfather, Thomas Rinehart. Both Barnet and his wife are buried in the old cemetery in East Waynesburg. Like his father-in-law before him, Barnet Rinehart served as sheriff of Greene County, being inducted into office in 1808. It is possible that Sarah Hook may have been married twice for William Rhodes noted in his Journal that on February 11, 1794, Sally Hook was married to Freeman.

### Children of Barnet and Sarah (Hook) Rinehart

- James Rinehart, born August 22, 1802, died March 29, 1879; married Delilah Eagon, a daughter of Solomon and Mary (Blackburn) Eagon. They are buried in the Forest Cemetery in Lincoln Township, Mahaska County, Iowa. Delilah Eagon was born March 21, 1805, died December 7, 1878.
  - Simon Rinehart, born February 22, 1805, died September 1, 1881; married Hannah Morris, born 1809, died 1893. Both are buried in Green Mount Cemetery, Waynesburg, Pennsylvania.
  - Samuel Rinehart, married Mary Eagon.
  - Lucy B. Rinehart, born February 10, 1810; married James Green, born December 6, 1803, died March 20, 1879.
  - Mary Rinehart, born 1812, died April 17, 1847, aged 35 years and four months.
4. The documents of John Hook of Kentucky, mentions two sisters, one of whom married James Faree, and another who married a Slater, and had a son, Thomas. This latter marriage indicates a marriage with one of Thomas Slater's sons, whose wives have not been identified. Census records suggest they were older children of Captain James Hook, and married prior to 1790.
6. James Hook, Jr., was born in 1776, and died in 1838. He married about 1795, Charlotte Morris, daughter of Richard and Mary (Seals) Morris, who died May 13, 1827, aged 52 years, one month, 19 days. Both are said to have been buried in the old cemetery in East Waynesburg, but markers have disappeared. James Hook, Jr., was equally prominent with his father and quite successful in business. It is apparent that men seeking to leave for the west, found him a ready buyer of their property from which he profited nicely. He was among the list of first owners of lots in the new Town of Waynesburg, and purchased other lots from original owners, among them being the "hotel corner," which he bought from Christian Fair. This lot he sold on May 29, 1814, to John Inghram, who then established the "Bulls Head Tavern" on the site. After the death of his father James Hook, Jr., bought on July 1, 1825, from Greenberry Ridgely Jones, and wife, Rebecca, 226 acres of land described as "being the tract of land on which Jackson's Fort formerly stood, adjacent to the Town of Waynesburg." Here James Hook, Jr., laid out a town which he called Perrysville, but later familiarly known as "Hookstown," the plot of which may be seen in Deed Book 13, page 357. The town extended roughly from the present Woodlawn Avenue to Porter Street, and was on both sides of Main Street. A number of lots were given to his children, including one on which there has been erected a tanyard, which he gave to his son, Benedict Hook. One lot on which a smith shop stood, adjoined lots sold to Barnet Adams. The old Jackson and Hathaway mill site became the property of his son, Jesse Hook. Tradition mentions a saw mill operated by James Hook, from which timbers were donated to build a bridge at the foot of "town hill," the people of the town donating the labor to build it. Under the heading of James Hook, Sr., we have seen where the son had taken part in the establishment of "The Franklin School House," where it is probable that the children of James Hook, Jr., were educated.

### Family of James and Charlotte (Morris) Hook

- Sarah Hook, born October 28, 1796, died August 2, 1849; married, February 7, 1818, John Ganlear, born November 6, 1795, died September 1, 1852. It seems most certain that John Ganlear was a son of Peter Ganlear, (spelled Ganler) who is buried in the old cemetery in East Waynesburg, and whose marker shows he died September 17, 1859, at the age of 90 years. Records of the family are copied from a Family Bible owned by Mr. Wood Ganlear of Waynesburg, and from O. C. Docket 5, pp. 90.

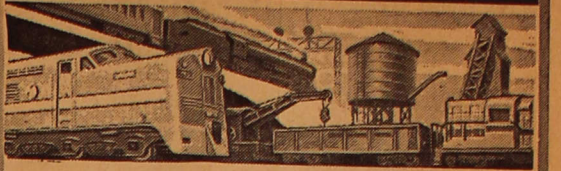

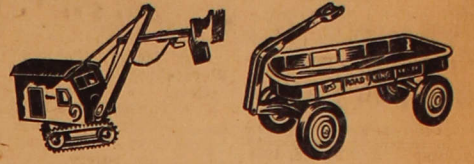

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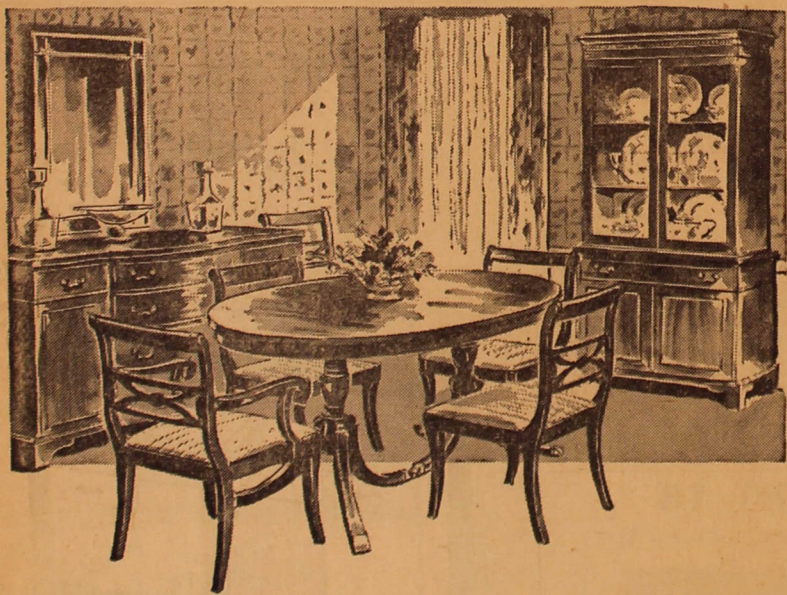
