





Ronco Mine to Close June 25, **Coal Exhausted**

The long and productive career of the 54-year-old Ronco Mine of U. S. Steel's Frick District in Fayette County will come to a close June 25, when the last mine-able coal is loaded into a barge for its voyage down the Monon-gahela river, signalizing the final exhaustion of the mine. There are now approximately

There are now approximately 400 men employed at Ronco. The rapid exhaustion of coal will re-quire further reductions in the work force, the first of which will occur at the end of March

work force, the first of which will occur at the end of March when about 25 per cent of em-ployes will be laid off. Cognizant of the general pro-duction decline in the coal indus-try, U. S. Steel's Frick District has already met with officers of the Fayette County Development Council and is developing plans to assist the Council's efforts to encourage new industry to settle in Fayette County. Frick Dis-trict engineers are now surveying the Ronco and other desirable properties to a scert ain what buildings and other facilities can be made available for immediate industrial development. Since the Ronco Mine opened in 1901, its 25,000,000 tons of high-grade metallurgical co al have helped to provide America with the sinews of war as well as essential civilian requirements. The mining life of Ronco was extended in 1941 when 396 acres of Greene County coal was added to Ronco's complement of 4,631 tacres. This addition of acreage permitted the construction of two headings under the Monongahela river and served as the spring board for the development of the Rohena Mine.

A nationwide study of golfing mishaps shows that this popular pastime is producing an average of two serious accidents per year per course. More than 4,000 Little League baseball games will be played June 14 to raise funds for the Na-tional Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

League President Peter J. Mc-Govern said collections would be taken during the games on that date designated "Little League Polio Day." per course. Golfers, the Institute said, often overlook the fact that the golf ball, a hard-shelled object travelling at some 250 miles per hour, is a dangerous missile. They also discount the dangers of lightning, heat prostration and sunstroke, and ignore the haz-ards of motor vehicles as they cross roads running through the course.



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
