Disservice to State Senate

Time was when a senator, be he sitting in Washington or in Harrisburg, surrounded himself with such an aura of dignity as to preclude the possibility of any words or actions unworthy of his high

Perhaps this is still true at the National Capital, but in the Commonwealth's center of legislative activity it is gone

with the wind . . . a big wind, too.

It may be that Senators Haluska and Dent believe that billingsgate is expected from them on the floor of the State Senate, where immunity from libel permits them to say just about anything they wish as long as it is neither obscene nor lascivious, but we fail to find anything commendable in the kind of talk both senators used on the senate floor a few days ago.

Haluska, enraged because a Pittsburgh correspondent wrote a story about the teachers' pay-raise bill—a story not at all to the senatorial taste-rose in his majesty on the Hill and accused the newspaperman of all manner of evil-doing, larding his comment with such epithets as "rat" and "stinking mackerel."

Even making allowance for time-honored custom of politicians to belabor the press when stories not to their liking are

printed, we fail to find anything entertaining or amusing in the blasts of Senator Haluska

We do not believe that Haluska's fellow senators, of either party, are very proud of his attack, and most certainly we do not think the enraged senator did himself or his party a service by the intemperance of his remarks.

Both Haluska and Dent know full well, if they really studied the Pittsburgh story, that the only thing to criticize about it was an improperly used headline over the dispatch, a head which incidentally was corrected in later editions.

Both Haluska and Dent know, when their bad tempers are under control, that the story they attacked so angrily was accurate reporting.

The estimable gentlemen will do well to recall that in the Roosevelt and Truman administrations nationally, and in the Leader administration in Pennsylvania, the press has been made the whipping boy for any fancied grievance of the Democratic leaders. Despite their false approach to freedom of the press, the world of newspaperdom will continue to reflect, with great accuracy, the words and actions of those who occupy the newsworthy stage.—Harrisburg Patriot.

Realizing the need for more adequate services to children in Greene County the County Commissioners were at liberty to develop a program either in the form of a private agency or a public agency, and chose the former.

The private funds which are being solicited at this time are to augment the funds appropriated by the County Commissioners. Children are given psychological tests which are invaluable in placing them.

cal tests which are invaluable in placing them.
Certain situations referred to the society by the County Commissioners and others are known as private situations—individuals who seek help, either voluntarily or because they have been referred by nurses, physicians and others. They may be neglected children, unwed mothers or parents who need help and guidance in the care and training of their children.

in the care and training or their children.

At the present time there are 62 children under care—16 of these are in foster homes and the remainder are being cared for either in their own homes, or are in the Children's Home awaiting further plans.

Greene County is one of the few remaining counties in the state with a Children's Home which is considered to be an outmoded way of caring for children. This was one of the reasons the County Commissioners were urged to establish some other means of caring for dependent and neglected children.

Also from private funds the society makes an effort to see that each child has something for Christmas; that something is done for them on their birthdays, and that incidental school expenses are met—in other words, that they are given the opportunity to live the kind of life that every normal child is entitled.

Few parents contributed to the expenses are met—findly in the County Home. Now the society finds in many cases parents can assist financially, or that compensation is available through other sources. Foster parents are paid a flat rate for boarding children. Ciothing, medical and dental expenses are paid by the society Children are given regular examination by a pediatrician.

Erie Man Preparing For South Pole Trip As Civilian Advisor To Admiral Byrd

—Washington—

In 1928, a Boy Scout from Erie, Pa., Journey to the bottom of the world.

The trip, in large measure, set the course of his life.

The Scout was Paul Siple and he was chosen out of 600,000 applicants to accompany Admiral Richard E. Byrd's first expedition to the South Pole region.

Since then, he has gone on three other trips with Byrd to the Antarctic.

Today he is busy getting ready for his fifth, this time as top civilian advisor to Byrd and Captain George Dufex, task force commander of "Operation Deep Freeze." This operation, which starts in November and will last perhaps five years, will consist of investigations by scientists from 14 countries, including Russia and, of course, the United States. Now a robust, pipe -smoking man of 46, Dr. Siple is regarded as one of the foremost experts on cold weather.

The Navy has borrowed him for the trip from the Army, for which he has been scientific advisor to the chief of research and development.





Lonich's cellar was so small, there was no room to escape—the kids had to protect themselves and swing back.

Later, Johnny boxed in amateur bouts in a roller skating rink, usually coming out of them with the nod.

Along came World War II and Johnny went off to England, flying 30 aerial missions as a tail gunner in a bomber.

When he returned, it was said of him that his right hand resembled a cocked gun and he hadn't forgotten how to shoot.

By this time he was a beautiful 160-pound specimen. He enrolled in Waynesburg College and continued boxing practice.

In 1946, he entered and won the 160-pound title in Pittsburgh's Golden Gloves Tourney.

He was tagged a "fancy dan" boxer with little punch, but with plenty of maneuverability. He won mostly on decisions, outpointing foes and evading sluggers' knockout blows.

But in 1947, he surprised fans and sportswriters by knocking out four opponents in winning his second Dapper Dan Golden Gloves title.

JOHNNY KOMLO

Greene County's bid for a place in the boxing world came late in the half century.

Although the principle was a native of Fredericktown, Washington County, he fought under the Orange and Black colors of Waynesburg College where he pursued higher learning.

Johnny Komlo brought the county to its boxing feet for a brief moment in the late 1940s.

When only 14 years old, Johnny began fighting in the village of Vesta Heights, near Fredericktown.

Children of miners would match up each other physically, then put on boxing gloves and spar around in the middle of the road—calling time out when automobiles and passersby came upon the struggling scene.

When winter came, they migrated to Alec Lonich's house, where, in the cellar with a low celling, they crouched to keep from being hit on top—by the rafters.

Clodhoppers, heavy mining shoes worn in mining communities, were not exactly adept to boxing, although for slugging they gave the boys a good grip on the ground.

In July 1947, Johnny launched his brief professional career by knocking out Pittsburgh's Bobby Fuller in the first round in a preliminary match in Zivic Arena.

Then he ran into some pretty rough boys who were capable of messing up his good-looking face.

Before earning his sheepskin, Johnny decided there were more sensible ways to make a living and he took advantage of his education.


