

Erie Man Preparing For South Pole Trip As Civilian Advisor To Admiral Byrd

—Washington—

In 1928, a Boy Scout from Erie, Pa., journeyed to the bottom of the world.

The trip, in large measure, set the course of his life.

The Scout was Paul Siple and he was chosen out of 600,000 applicants to accompany Admiral Richard E. Byrd's first expedition to the South Pole region.

Since then, he has gone on three other trips with Byrd to the Antarctic.

Today he is busy getting ready for his fifth, this time as top civilian advisor to Byrd and Captain George Dufex, task force commander of "Operation Deep Freeze." This operation, which starts in November and will last perhaps five years, will consist of investigations by scientists from 14 countries, including Russia and, of course, the United States.

Now a robust, pipe-smoking man of 46, Dr. Siple is regarded as one of the foremost experts on cold weather.

The Navy has borrowed him for the trip from the Army, for which he has been scientific advisor to the chief of research and development.

Dr. Siple, a native of Montpelier, Ohio, who grew up in Erie, Pa., views "Operation Deep Freeze" as the most challenging exploration to which he has been assigned.

This stems partly from the fact that he is the Navy's choice to lead a staff of scientists who will be based for a year exactly at the South Pole. Siple said:

"No one has ever lived there for more than two or three days—and that was during the summer when the temperature is around zero.

"But in the winter, the temperature gets in excess of 100 degrees below zero. The only living thing there is a skua gull. Our biggest problem will be the struggle to stay alive.

"It is probably the coldest spot in the world."

Actually, there is some doubt that the Navy will be able to build the station at the South Pole where Dr. Siple hopes to live.

First, it must be determined whether people can be landed there. Then the construction crew will have to build the three pre-fabricated buildings with pieces dropped from airplanes.

Adding to the difficulties, the planes will be flying from 700 miles away.

But if everything works out, Siple and his crew will move in sometime in 1957. Then comes a year of research and trying to keep warm. Siple said:

"It will be so cold that when it gets to 60 or 70 below we'll have to warm our fuel in order to make it flow.

"The houses? They'll be pre-fabricated, with aluminum on the outside and fiber glass and plywood on the inside."

Ancient Redwood Log Discovered

—Scotia, California—

An unrotted redwood log, evidently buried by a landslide thousands of years ago has been dug up here. Highway workers who found the log 40 feet underground in one of their excavations said it was below the stumps of other redwoods which had been cut in 1889 when they were 1,500 to 2,000 years old.

The wood of the log was blackish brown in color, evidently from pigment absorbed from the soil, but there was no sign of rot, they said.

Marian Anderson To Appear With Symphony

No concert artists of the present day is revered and honored by so many people as is Marian Anderson, distinguished American contralto who will be the first soloist with the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra at its second pair of concerts Friday evening and Sunday afternoon, October 21 and 23, in Syria Mosque.

A maker of headlines for nearly two decades, Miss Anderson was front-page news again this year as the first of her race ever to sing with the Metropolitan Opera. It was in January, in a revival of Verdi's "The Masked Ball," conducted by Dimitri Mitropoulos.

She has been granted awards and degrees from cities, universities, societies and governments. In Japan, the Emperor conferred on her the coveted Yukosho medal. King Gustav Adolf presented her with Sweden's "Litteris et Artibus" medal. In Finland, the government awarded her the Order of the White Rose. Other honors have come from Haiti, France, Liberia and the Philippines.

Last summer her native Philadelphia dedicated the \$750,000 Marian Anderson Recreation Center in the neighborhood where the artist spent her childhood. She has been the recipient of five honorary doctorates and singularly honored by our own federal government when it offered her the use of Lincoln Memorial for an outdoor concert in Washington, a fitting tribute to the greatest concert personality of our time.

Miss Anderson has performed some 1,300 concerts before more than 5,000,000 persons, in addition to which millions more know her through her frequent broadcasts on the Bell Telephone Hour, her television appearances and her many recordings.

With the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra this week end she will sing Mahler's "Kindertotenlieder" song cycle and Saint-Saens' "My Heart at Thy Sweet Voice" from Samson and Delilah.

William Steinberg will conduct the orchestra in Schubert's Symphony No. 4, Ravel's Rapsodie Espagnole and Balakirev's Islamey.

Tickets for this and all concerts by the Pittsburgh Symphony are on sale at the symphony box office in Kaufmann's, at the personal service counters of Gimbel's and Horne's, or by mail order at the Pittsburgh Symphony offices.

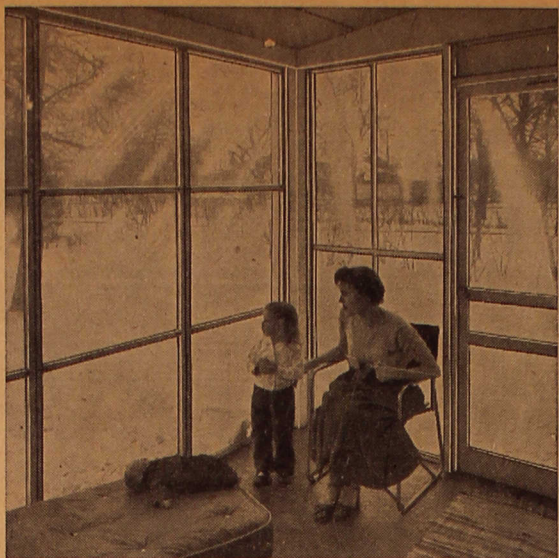
AMMONS FOX
