



We cut off aid to an anti-Communist Laos Government to compel acceptance of a coalition government with the Communists, a move which when made by the Truman administration with respect to Chiang Kai-shek, contributed to the fall of mainland China. From the beginning of their takeover of other nations, the Communists have used partici-Communists have used partici-pation in coalition governments as a means of taking over the governments completely. They first obtain the so-called "leverof-power" cabinet posts such as interior, with the police, communications, and defense, and then employ the power obtained

to seize the entire government. This was their procedure, for instance, in Czechoslovakia, which they completely took over

In giving Communist Poland a veto in the International Control Commission, set up to administer the provisions of the Laos accord, have we not repeated the Roosevelt administration's error in Yalta, of promising the Soviet Union a veto in tion's error in Yalta, of promising the Soviet Union a veto in




