## Authority, DER Settle Out Of Court

WAYNESBURG — The five municipalities which make up the Lower Ten Mile Joint Sewer Authority will not be in court in Harrisburg today as previously expected.

All five municipalities and the authority members were sued last month by the state Department of Environmental Resources for failure to progress with plans to build a sewage system and for discharging waste into the Ten Mile Creek.

For the past decade, the authority has discussed the project but little progress has been made. DER, in an attempt to get the authority moving, filed suit in Commonwealth Court.

Municipalities involved include East Bethlehem Township in Washington County and Morgan and Jefferson townships in Greene County and also Clarksville and Jefferson Borough.

Although the authority signed a consent decree earlier this month, the municipalities objected primarily on the basis of one paragraph which states the municipalities would automatically proceed with the project if approved by the DER. Municipal officers said they should be allowed to review the study and then decide if the project is feasible.

All parties apparently agreed to finish the feasibility study, but wanted to reserve judgment on actual construction. DER officials are apparently satisfied with the feasibility promise and therefore agreed to a "general continuance on the matter."

The municipalities, under the consent decree, will assume the responsibility of resolving problems cited by the DER. A timetable for resolving the problems is included in the decree.

The feasibility study must be completed by April 15, 1984, and the municipalities must share the expense.

## Body Of Drowning Victim Recovered

WAYNESBURG — The body of John Blackburn was recovered from the Waynesburg Water Dam late Monday morning by volunteer firemen some 20 hours after he slipped under the water while swimming.

The 20-year-old Bethel Park man was pronounced dead at the scene by Deputy Coroner Charles Behm.

Blackburn and his wife, Mary Lisa, were with five other couples who regularly swim at the dam located just off LR 30095 in Franklin Township.

According to a friend of the victim, the young couple were arguing when they arrived about 3:30 p.m. and Blackburn immediately jumped into the water and was attempting to swim across the 150-yard-wide pool of water.

Friends at first thought Blackburn had made the crossing and was ignoring the rest of the group until he cooled down. It wasn't until after 9 p.m. that a member of the group reported the victim missing.

## Aleppo Area Youth Drowns Near Dam

ALEPPO — A Greene County youth who survived an automobile accident in 1970 which killed all other members of his family drowned Saturday while swimming at the Youghiogheny Dam near Addison.

Timothy B. Keenan, 18, of Aleppo R.D.1, was pronounced dead at 1:40 p.m. when his body was recovered from 25 feet of water, about 100 feet from the shore at Summerfield Beach, which straddles the border of Somerset and Fayette counties. He was swimming there with his foster sister, Carol Slawson, and his girlfriend, Jane Lavigne.

According to state police in Somerset, Keenan could swim well and was near a buoy line when he suddenly faltered and went under, calling for help. They said he seemed to become tangled in the line and was gone when would-be rescuers got to him.

Roger Methaney, public affairs officer for the Confluence Fire Department, said a crew from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers found Keenan's body about five feet from the buoy line, approximately 40 minutes after he disappeared.

"They are not totally sure why he went under," Methaney said. "Several people tried to get to him; his friend tried to reach him, but no one could do

## Court Refuses To Dismiss Charge

WAYNESBURG — Greene County Court refused Tuesday to dismiss a criminal homicide charge against William V. Milesky, 46, of Waynesburg R.D.4 and the trial will begin Monday.

Milesky is accused in the shooting death of Kenneth C. Holvin, 19, the son of Milesky's common-law wife, Barbara S. Whitfield, on April 7.

Attorney Milton D. Rosenberg, representing Milesky, based his petition for dismissal on statements made by Donald Lee Cowsert, 28, of Washington, who was a witness to the shooting.

Rosenberg said Cowsert lied when he told state police and Magistrate John Watson that Milesky placed a shotgun against the stomach of the victim and pulled the trigger. Rosenberg called four witnesses who testified the victim's belt showed no signs of being hit by shotgun pellets.

Rosenberg also accused Cowsert of tampering with evidence and suggested he be prosecuted.

F. Charles Behm, deputy county coroner, testified that Cowsert brought the victim's belt to the funeral home on the day of the funeral services and it was eventually turned over to the state police.

Richard W. Owens, a member of the ambulance crew called to the scene on the night of the shooting, told the court he removed the victim's belt in order to treat the shotgun wound. Owens said the belt showed no signs of being hit by pellets.

Mark Fisher, another ambulance crew member, said he noticed the belt on the floor and later when he was retrieving equipment after the victim had been removed, looked closely at the belt and noticed no damage.

The victim's mother, Mrs. Whitfield, told the court she noticed her son's belt was bloody but it showed no signs of being hit by shotgun pellets.

Rosenberg said the testimony showed Cowsert had to be committing perjury when he said the gun was placed against the victim's belt when the shot was fired.

Rosenberg also said the belt appeared to have a hole in it when it was returned to the funeral home. "Cowsert had the belt for three days before he returned it," Rosenberg said.

District Attorney Charles Morris in his statement to the court cited several reasons he felt the motion to dismiss was out of order.

Morris said the decision to not prosecute or to seek a non-jury trial should be his alone and not the court's and cited case law. He also questioned why the defense would wait so long to bring up the issue and not seek to settle the issue in chambers.

Visibly upset, Morris said a prima facie case had been presented and, according to state laws, Milesky committed a crime by pointing a weapon. Morris also stated he would seek nothing higher than a third degree homicide conviction.

Morris also was upset that Rosenberg's motion filed in court last week was publicized in local newspapers and could possibly influence jurors already selected to hear the case.

In ruling on the motion, Toothman agreed the motion was not filed in a timely manner and the case should be brought to trial Monday morning.

Milesky, who was present in the courtroom, was not called to testify.

## Carmichaels Board Ratifies Contract

CARMICHAELS — The Carmichaels Area School Board ratified a contract with school cafeteria employees Thursday night and gave approval to several other business and personnel matters in preparation for the opening of school on Aug. 29.

The cafeteria employees had previously approved the contract which includes raises of 25 cents for the first year, and 30 cents for the second year and 40 cents for the third year for full-time employees.

An unexpected expense was approved from unbudgeted funds for the transportation of eight students to the Glad Tidings Christian School in Fayette County. This transportation is required by state law and will amount to \$35 a day.

The board nominated member Erma Jean Thomas for a seat on the board of Intermediate Unit I to fill a vacancy created by the resignation of William Ziefel of the West Greene School Board. Ziefel had requested Mrs. Thomas be named to take his place as he is leaving the West Greene board.

A nomination from the Carmichaels board was required before she could be considered for the position.

In personnel matters, John Krajnak was named athletic director because of the illness of Fred Stuvek and the resignation of Susan Lesako Martin, as cheerleader sponsor, was accepted. This vacancy will be posted among the staff.

The board extended its sympathy to the family of Mario Burchianti who died last week. Burchianti had taught biology in the district for 30 years.

Superintendent Dolores Zoldos announced the district has applied to PennDOT for material to use in its drug and alcohol education program and its driver education program. PennDOT will distribute free material as part of its educational program and will give teacher-training

workshops in the two subject areas. The district will give released time to three teachers to attend the workshops.

State approval has been received for eight days of early school dismissal during the 1983-84 year for curriculum development and revision. This time will be used for in-service sessions to begin implementation of the district's long-range plan. The four-year plan, which concentrates on curriculum improvements, was given final approval Thursday night.

The district was also notified of approval of vocational educational project funds of \$1,562 for a computer in the consumer homemaking department and \$865 for word processing equipment in the secretarial department.

An issue of the school district's "Familygram" will be sent out next week and will include the school discipline code and school schedule so that all parents may keep them as a reference.

## Borough Backs Elderly Plan

WAYNESBURG — Waynesburg Borough council Monday night adopted a resolution supporting an effort by the Waynesburg Economic Revitalization Commission to obtain a \$750,000 grant from the state Department of Community Affairs.

The grant will be used for housing rehabilitation and a unique program to aid the elderly.

Waynesburg has been chosen as a target community for an innovative new service for the frail elderly and their families.

Housing renovation, to be offered to low- and middle-income families, would be limited to an area covering the northeast quadrant of the borough. The area would be north of High Street and east of Morgan Street and would involve improvements such as plumbing, roofing, wiring and insulation.

In light of consumer concern, a recent study done by Waynesburg College business administration students for the Southwestern Pennsylvania Area Agency on Aging (AAA) show there are at least 141 families in Waynesburg and nearby communities who are presently providing personal care and assistance to an elderly relative in their homes.

This finding, coupled with significant population increases projected for the age group 75 and older by 1985, indicates families are, and will continue to be, the principal care givers for the frail elderly whose independence has become impaired by chronic health problems.

The study also showed at least 67 percent of these families have needed and will need some supportive services which help them, as care givers, to continue to be able to adequately help these frail elders over a long-term basis.

With these needs in mind, planning has begun for a new program called the Residential Center for the Frail

Elderly, which will round out the spectrum of non-institutional long-term care services.

The center would offer services which complement, not duplicate, the in-home health and supportive services currently available from Greene County Hospital Home Health, Hospice of Greene County and Washington-Greene Community Action and others.

The center would primarily offer therapeutic services in a protective setting where health-impaired persons can live for a short time while their family care givers are away from home for reasons of hospitalization, visits to out-of-town relatives or merely for a vacation rest.

In addition, the center would offer emergency shelter as well.

The center will begin as a small facility for about eight elders. Health care professionals would visit daily.

Room board and personal care costs will be covered by individual payments while AAA-funded services will be free to all persons age 60 or older.

An advisory committee was recently formed to oversee the development of the center. Members include the Rev. Mary Zook, Dr. Bennett Rich, Dr. Lester Moston, Anna De-Vincentis, Mary Zsiros, Betty G. Long, Robert McJoy, Denise K. Harris and Robert Lang.

The committee is currently looking for a suitable site. Persons aware of possible home or lots should call Lois Leathers at 852-1510.

In other action, council formally appointed David Gregg as BOCA Code Enforcement Officer and also police chief Tim Hawfield and Michael Molholland to the 911 Communication Committee.

Council members voted 6-1 to award a contract to Tri-County Carpet for the installation of carpet in the police station.


This is just one of the masterpieces completed during "project time" in Mrs. Emrich's class last Sunday. On the back was the artist's own signature: "Glenn J."

## Music Promoter Files Suit

WAYNESBURG — The promoter who held the Greene County Coal Miners Jamboree in Morgan Township on June 26 has charged that the firm responsible for providing security on the grounds allowed some 4,000 people to attend without paying their \$15 admission fee.

The allegation was contained in a countersuit which Jack Litten of Jefferson filed Wednesday to a lawsuit brought against him and against Kathy Davis of Clarksville R.D.1 by H&K Security Inc., California. That action claimed that Litten and Davis owed the firm \$21,000 for providing guards, administrative personnel and other security services.

In his answer, Litten stated that

Davis had no liability since she was not a partner to the agreement, merely acting as his secretary. He also stated that H&K violated the contract by doing a "negligent and unprofessional" job which permitted people to go through the gates and climb fences to get onto the grounds.

Litten said he lost \$60,000 in potential admissions because of that negligence, and filed his countersuit to recover that amount from H&K.

In addition, Litten petitioned the court to have H&K joined as an additional defendant in the lawsuit brought by Ronald and Sandra Chidister of Jefferson R.D.1, owners of the farm on which the country music jamboree was held.

# Miners Most Valuable, Trumka Tells Audience

CARMICHAELS — A large audience which attended the annual Pennsylvania Mine Rescue Contest in Carmichaels Saturday was told that miners are the most valuable resource involved in the production of coal, but that too often profit takes precedence over safety.

Richard L. Trumka, international president of the United Mine Workers of America, was featured speaker at a memorial program which followed the rescue meet, which was won by U.S. Steel's Frick District team.

The meet, with 22 teams competing, was the opening event of the 30th annual Pennsylvania Bituminous Coal Show.

Trumka said that he had been at the scene of several mine disasters recently which resulted in loss of life, including one in July at the Helen Mining Company's Helen mine in Homer City, where an explosion claimed the life of Sylvester Lee Mitsko, who was in Carmichaels last year as a member of his mine's rescue team.

"What troubles me is the knowledge that those tragedies could have been avoided," Trumka said. "A coal mine explosion is not an act of God. It is the result of corporate policies which give priority to production and profit over safety and human life. Often coal companies have an excellent safety program on paper and a non-existent program in the mine and at the working face."

The UMW president, a native of Nemaocolin, pointed out that billions of dollars are invested in the coal industry in the form of machinery.

"Yet all this equipment, all this invested capital, is totally worthless without the skilled service of men and women who work in the mines. It is we, by our skills and through hard work, who make the very existence of the coal industry possible. We are the

most valuable resource involved in the production of coal.

"Yet history has taught coal miners that their safety and health cannot be left solely in the hands of the coal operators. It has taught us that every safety appliance so far developed is useless unless properly maintained and utilized. It has taught us that strong mine health and safety laws vigorously enforced are our basis protections.

"Only when it becomes more profitable to operate our coal mines safely will the men and women engaged in the mining of coal have the margin of safety presently enjoyed by millions of other American workers."

He complimented the mine safety teams present for their dedication to the team concept of saving lives. "The skills you have learned, and which you demonstrate here, may well prevent the deaths of others who work in the mines," he said.

As part of the program, memorial safety lamps were presented to the Helen mine rescue team and to Edward Mitsko, father of the team member who was killed in the explosion. Mitsko, a 46½ year veteran in the mines, said that in 1940 he saw 63 men killed in a mine disaster at the Coppers Coal Co. mine in Portage and is well acquainted with the grief that families suffer.

"Mine safety is a two-way street between the coal companies and the work force," he said. "When the two finally meet, then maybe we'll be able to stop the killing in the mines."

The Frick District team which won the contest was made up of men from U.S. Steel mines in the Greene and Fayette county area. It was captained by Richard Settles, with William Wilson as briefing officer. Members were Gerard Kosco, Andrew Berdar, Charles Dues, Joseph Ritz, Fred Mehok and Jack Gearing.

Joseph Kaminski presented the winning team with the first-place trophy presented by CSE Mine Services. Debbie Tekavec, the 1982 Coal Queen, and Trumka presented each team member with a plaque from the UMWA.

Second place went to another U.S. Steel team — the Cumberland mine No. 1 team from Kirby. Its members were Emory Pelkey, captain; Ken Titus, briefing officer, and John Chambers Jr., Gerald Patton, Fred Waive, John Simondo and Robert Bohach. Its trophy was presented by National Mine Service.

Third place went on a tie breaker to the Florence Mining Co. No. 2 team, with Marvin Lichenflus as briefing officer and Dave Betts as captain. Both it and the G.M.&W. Coal Co. team, which placed fourth, had seven "discount" points in the simulated mine disaster problems the teams had to cope with under the scrutiny of teams of judges. Written examinations were also taken in the high school as part of the competition.

The third and fourth-place trophies were presented, respectively, by Mine Safety Appliances and the Keystone Bituminous Coal Association.

Willis E. Cupp, District 2 director of the Mine Safety and Health Administration, directed the meet, with Martin Connors, president of the Pennsylvania Bituminous Safety Association, serving as chairman. Stephen McCann, honorary general chairman, served as master of ceremonies for the memorial service and for an early morning program which officially opened the Coal Show. It featured the presentation of colors by Carmichaels Boy Scout Troop 1262, reading of a proclamation by Sara L. Ruth, president of the sponsoring King Coal Association, and an address of welcome by Martin Connors.

WAYNESBURG — More than 130 motorcyclists from several states took part Saturday when the Greene County Chapter of ABATE held its fourth annual "bikers' run" to benefit the Muscular Dystrophy Association (MDA).

James Kirby of Waynesburg, president of the motorcycle association, said bikers came from as far away as Michigan to join local cyclists in making the run.

As in the past, it started from the parking lot of Heck's Department

Store on Sugar Run Road in Waynesburg and wound through Greene and Washington counties to end in Holbrook, where a concert and picnic was held.

# Commissioners OK Plans For Store In Carmichaels

WAYNESBURG — Financing arrangements for the establishment of a new convenience food store in Carmichaels were approved by the Greene County commissioners at their meeting Thursday.

County approval is needed because part of the financing will be handled through the Greene County Industrial Development Authority through a low-interest loan obtained through the Pennsylvania Industrial Development Authority.

The convenience store, with self-service gasoline pumps, will be erected by the Chico Dairy Co., Morgantown, W. Va., at the corner of Vine and George streets — the intersection of Route 88 and old Route 21. The property, measuring 150 by 150 feet, has been purchased from Mr. and Mrs. Marion Palone Jr., who formerly operated a used car lot on the site.

George K. Stennett, county development director, said the GCID Authority held a public hearing on Chico Dairy's application for a development loan Wednesday evening, at which time the application was approved.

Total estimated cost of the project, which involves construction of a 2,750-square-foot building, is \$423,000, with the company planning to obtain a loan of \$295,000. It will carry interest at 75 percent of the prime rate.

Industrial and commercial development loans are available to firms which plan construction which

will provide new employment. The Chico store is expected to provide 20 new jobs. A house which is located on part of the property will be razed, Stennett said.

In other action, the commissioners accepted, with regret, the resignation of John Curtis, recreation supervisor with the county Department of Parks and Recreation. Curtis has accepted a position as a health teacher and coach in the Jefferson-Morgan School District.

The commissioners also accepted the resignation of Mary Lou Lingis, assessor in Jefferson Township. County Assessor Perry Bavera said the township supervisors have been asked to recommend a replacement.

Fulbab Inc. of Canton, Ohio, was authorized to make repairs to a T-hanger at the county airport which was damaged when it was hit by a plane which crashed on April 12. The pilot of the plane and a passenger escaped with minor injuries. The repairs will cost \$2,736, of which all but \$100 is covered by insurance.

The commissioners voted to accept a one-year grant of \$24,000 from the Department of Public Welfare under the In-Home Services Demonstration Program funded through the Federal Jobs Bill. Major purposes of the grant are to provide in-home social services to people who are ready for discharge from hospitals or nursing homes and to provide employment opportunities for public assistance clients. The \$24,000 is ex-

pected to provide funding for the employment of two in-home service workers.

Lou Lignelli, director of the Washington County Employment and Training Agency, notified the commissioners that the state has formally approved creation of a Washington-Greene Private Industry Council for administration of the new Job Training Partnership Act in the two counties.

He said the bi-county council will meet within the next few weeks to complete plans for implementation of the program on Oct. 1. It will administer various job training programs as successor to the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA), which will cease to exist on Sept. 30.
