County Endorses Funding

WAYNESBURG — The Greene County commissioners at their meeting Thursday endorsed an application by Greene County Industrial Developments Inc. to utilize industrial revenue bond funding in the construction of a gas fractionation plant at Waynesburg.

The \$2 million project will be a joint effort by Carnegie Natural Gas and the Tembec Co., a partnership created by EmBee Co. of Atlantic Beach, N.C., and individuals at Muse, Stancil and Co., a petroleum consulting firm located in Dallas, Texas.

Carnegie will build and operate a natural gas liquids (NGL) extraction plant adjoining its pump station near the Greene County Fairgrounds at a cost of \$1.2 million. It will tap the company's main gas pipeline from West Virginia to Pennsylvania.

The NGL produced will be processed in a fractionation plant to be built at the same location by Tembec at a cost of \$886,000. The fractionation process is expected to produce 40 percent propane, 40 percent butane and 20 percent natural gasoline for blending purposes.

The Carnegie extraction plant will produce from 12,000 to 18,000 gallons of liquids per day, all of which will go to the Tembec fractionator. Since it will have a capacity of 40,000 gallons per day, it will also be able to process liquids from other producers.

George K. Stennett, GCID executive director, told the commissioners that at least five new jobs will be created at the plant site, with the possibility of additional jobs resulting in the trucking industry.

He said the GCID Authority, at a meeting Wednesday, approved the issuance of an \$800,000 tax exempt industrial revenue mortgage and note to fund the Tembec project. The application is now subject to state approval. A commitment letter for the \$800,000 has been received from Gallatin National Bank.

In other developments at the meeting, the commissioners were notified by the Department of Welfare that a county Human Services Development Fund grant has been reduced from \$30,000 to \$25,206 as a result of a cut in statewide funding from \$5.5 million to \$4 million.

The county plans to use the allocation for development of a program by the Community Action Corp. to coordinate human services provided by various agencies in the county.

The commissioners agreed to Greene County participation in a statewide project being undertaken by the Division of Archives of the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission.

Using a \$213,000 federal grant, the agency will inventory records of county governments at court houses throughout the state, gather information on their general condition and storage location, and create a machine-readable data base to facilitate use of the records.

The commissioners announced that two county offices have been moved from the old County Office Building to the remodeled third floor of the new County Office Building.

The Veterans' Affairs office is located in rooms 302 and 304, and the Emergency Medical Services Council office is located in Room 310. In addition, the Waynesburg office of state Sen. Barry Stout has been moved from the second floor to the third floor of the new building.

Disqualified From Local Drug Case

WAYNESBURG — The attorney general's office at Harrisburg will be asked to appoint a special prosecutor to handle the case in which Waynesburg attorney Robert D. Berryman is charged with 15 counts of possessing cocaine.

Judge Glenn Toothman handed down the order in Greene County Court Friday after District Attorney Charles Morris agreed to disqualify his office from prosecuting the case following presentation of a petition by defense attorney Leonard I. Sharon of Pittsburgh.

It charged that Morris and Assistant District Attorney Mary Pruss acted in bad faith and violated the judicial Canon of Ethics during negotiations which preceded Berryman's arrest by Waynesburg police on July 17.

Berryman, 32, is one of five persons who have been charged with drug law violations by Lt. David Clark as the result of a lengthy investigation. Others arrested to date are John G. Balsamo, 33, owner of a Waynesburg pizza shop; David E. Smitley, 35, of Waynesburg; Michael Conklin, 24, of Waynesburg; and William R. Henderson, 41, of Sycamore R.D.1.

Morris, who was in court when Sharon's petition was presented, did not contest the action. When he pointed out that Berryman's hearing has been rescheduled for Thursday of next week, Sharon said he would be willing to have it postponed to give the new prosecutor an opportunity to become acquainted with the case.

The petition states that on July 16, the day before Berryman's arrest, he and his attorney attended a meeting with Lt. Clark at the district attorney's office to discuss a plea bargain and were told that if Berryman agreed to certain considerations no charges would be filed against him.

"Shortly after the final offer was tendered it was discovered that Clark, during the negotiating process, had already filed charges and intended to arrest the movant (Berryman) in the offices of the district attorney," the petition states.

It adds that Morris and Mrs. Pruss "knew a warrant was being secured and that they had intentionally lied to and misled the movant and counsel

during the negotiations in their offer of an arrangement concerning the charges.

"That notwithstanding their bad-faith conduct the office of the district attorney then offered that if the movant agreed upon the same considerations the charges would now be withdrawn. The movant was given until July 17 to accept or decline the offer.

"On the morning of July 17 the movant, alone, met with District Attorney Morris and accepted the offer. He was informed that the charges would be withdrawn. It was later discovered that Morris again intentionally lied to and misled the movant. The charges were not withdrawn and there was never any intention by Morris to withdraw the same....

"It is evident that the district attorney's office of Greene County has engaged in wholesale violation of the Canons. It is unclear whether their conduct is motivated by their own inability to mold their conduct to the Canons or by an inability to control Lt. Clark, whose conduct is not governed by our Canons," the petition concludes.

Hospital Billings May Be Delayed

WAYNESBURG — Greene County Memorial Hospital has announced that all outpatient and emergency room billings for Medicare patients may be delayed for six to eight months as a result of a recent law passed by Congress.

The new law affects payments for laboratory services received by Medicare patients only, according to hospital spokeswoman Betty G. Long.

Central Greene Hires Several New Teachers

WAYNESBURG — The Central Greene School Board, at a meeting Tuesday, hired several teachers and took care of other matters relating to personnel in preparation for the start of the 1984-85 school year later this month.

The board also increased the salary of starting teachers and long-term substitutes from \$12,900 to \$14,000, noting the action was being taken so the district can continue to attract teachers and remain competitive with surrounding districts. Long-term substitutes also were granted all the rights and privileges provided for by the teachers' contract.

Brenda K. Braun, a 1983 graduate of West Virginia University with one year of experience, was employed as an elementary teacher and will be assigned to the first grade at the East Franklin School.

Christine Holzworth, an Edinboro graduate with four years of experience in working with emotionally troubled students in Pittsburgh, was employed as teacher for the special education class in the Whiteley School.

Barbara D. Knight, an Indiana State University graduate with a master's degree in reading and eight years of experience, was employed as an elementary teacher at the Spraggs School. She has been a long-term substitute in the district.

Phyllis R. McCall of Waynesburg, a former teacher in the district, was employed as an elementary teacher and assigned to the second grade at the Spraggs School.

Virginia Hunnell of Waynesburg, a former teacher in the district, was employed to fill a one-year sabbatical leave vacancy in the first grade at the East Franklin School.

Deborah Iams, a language arts teacher at the middle school, was appointed to fill the position of middle school guidance counselor during the first semester while Raymond Murdock is on leave. Barbara Gernert was employed to fill the temporary vacancy created by Iams' transfer.

Pauline Churella, a home economics teacher at the middle school, was granted a one-year leave of absence for further study. Maternity leaves were granted to Michelle Ezarik, a middle school physical education teacher, for the first semester, and to Lori Aldhizer, a third grade teacher at the Perry School, for eight weeks during the first semester.

The part-time position of Phyllis Canan as guidance secretary at the middle school was expanded to a full-time position.

The board approved establishment of a part-time art and industrial arts to give the full-time teachers an opportunity for program planning. Due to the number of students requesting Spanish at the high school, the board created a part-time position to augment the present teaching staff. It also established a classroom monitor position for the Whiteley School.

Due to increased enrollment, the present half-time kindergarten programs at the Spraggs and Perry schools were expanded to provide full-time kindergarten and junior first grade programs at both schools.

Accepted the resignation of Dr. Jeffrey Smith, school physician for "town" schools, and appointed Dr. Floyd Ring to replace him on the basis of his proposal of \$40 per hour.

County Prison Board Reorganizes

WAYNESBURG — After being disbanded for over four months, the Greene County Prison Board held a reorganization meeting Thursday and acted on several items, including a per diem increase for out-of-county prisoners.

The board went out of existence in March but was re-established at the request of Sheriff Remo Bertugli who felt many of the decisions concerning the jail should be handled by a board rather than the sheriff.

John Gardner was elected president and Bertugli was elected secretary.

Big Crowd Ignores Heat To Jam Fair

WAYNESBURG — Favored with good weather, the first full day of the Greene County fair proved to be a winner Tuesday as several thousand people surged through the midway from the exhibition halls at one end to the livestock barns at the other.

"We had a very good turnout tonight," Fair Manager Larry Marshall said. "The high humidity and threat of rain didn't seem to keep too many people away."

Those who watched the harness races experienced the establishment of a track record for the fair.

Veteran racing secretary Riley White said it was set by Red Sota, a 3-year-old pacer owned by Mrs. William Swartz of Stoneboro. He was driven across the line by Doug Reese of Belle Vernon in a flat 2 minutes in the first heat of a Pennsylvania Sire Stake race, cutting more than three seconds off the record of 2:03 set in 1981 by Billy Von.

Red Sota also bettered the former record in the second heat by turning in a time of 2:02.

"We're one of very few county fairs in the state which can boast a 2-minute track record," White said. He noted that Red Sota is also scheduled to race in a free-for-all pace which will be part of the Thursday afternoon harness program.

The 4-H Market Lamb Show was one of the feature attractions for the day, competing for the crowd with horse pulling contests, the first night of harness racing, halls and barns which are filled to capacity, and a midway area jammed with rides, game booths and food stands.

"I would say this is the largest display we have ever had," said Mary Jane Kent, one of the superintendents of the Home and Garden Department. "There are more than 2,000 entries with lots of flowers and vegetables, crafts of all kinds, artwork and double the amount of canned goods which we had a few years ago. We had five judges working and it took them most

of the day to complete their job."

A special attraction Tuesday night was a bake sale held following the judging of baked goods. Where exhibitors permitted, pies, cakes, bread and other baked goods were sold rather than allowing them to go stale by sitting throughout the fair. A sampling of each item was retained for display. Proceeds from this year's sale will go to the American Cancer Society.

One of the highlights of today's program will be the 19th annual 4-H Baby Beef show, which will be held at 6:30 p.m. as a follow-up to the Market Lamb show held Tuesday night.

Judging in the livestock barn will focus on the large class of beef cattle. It will begin at 9 a.m.

Today also will be a special one for children who attend the afternoon program. It will begin at 11:30 a.m. with a show on the grandstand stage featuring the Koal Krackin' Klowns. Another children's program and drawings for some 75 prizes will be held at 2:30 p.m. All midway rides for children will be offered at reduced prices from 1 to 4 p.m.

The afternoon racing program will begin at 1 p.m. and will include three thoroughbred races, a quarter horse race, a pony race and a mule cart race. The harness race program will begin at 6 p.m. It will include four Pennsylvania Sires Stakes races and a pace for non-winners of \$1,000 in 1984, an event to be held in four heats.

Judging Highlights
Both dairy cattle and 4-H beef heifers were judged Tuesday, with 4-H fitting and showing contests also being held.

Winners of grand champion and reserve champion rosettes in the dairy show were won by Robert Haines of Spraggs for Guernseys and J.G. Dinsmore of West Finley for Brown Swiss and Jerseys.

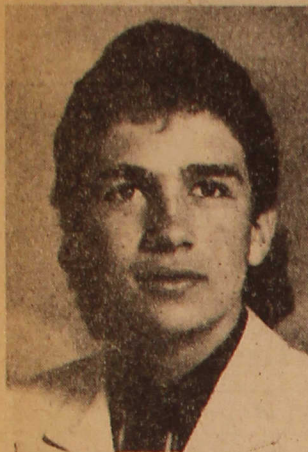
The board decided to meet at noon on the first Thursday of each month at Albert's Restaurant, with the exception of one meeting each quarter which must be held at the jail.

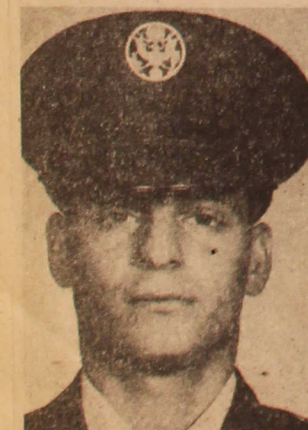

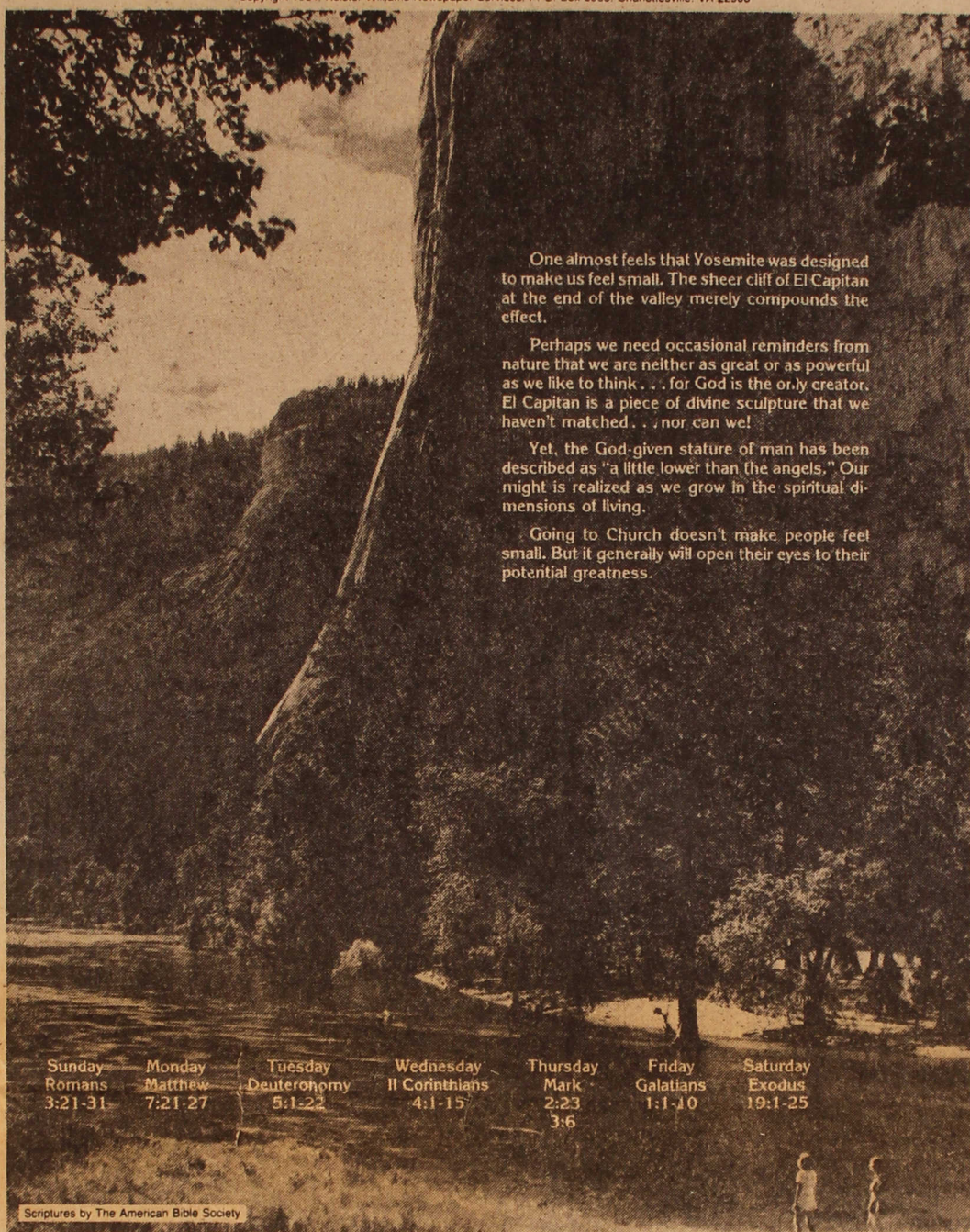
He is a 1982 graduate of Cameron High School.

Magazine Reviews College's 'Mental Fitness' Publication

WAYNESBURG — The Waynesburg College publication, "Reading for Mental Fitness — An Introduction to Fifty Representative Novels," is the subject of a review in the recent issue of "Pennsylvania Portfolio," official state publication about Pennsylvania authors, books and libraries. It states:

"In this electronic age it is a pleasure to find a person who still discovers mystery, enchantment and delight in the printed page. Alvin Laidley has written a brief and succinct 'Reading for Mental Fitness' published by Waynesburg College. It could be termed a self-help book.

"The opening chapter, 'Why Read,' offers encouragement and motivation for the person curious about international literature but hesitant and diffident about embarking on a reading program. The chapter ends with a list of fifty novels Laidley considers a basis for acquir-

ing knowledge of comparative literature and the novel form.

"Subsequent chapters are devoted to the literature of Spain, Italy, Germany, Norway, Russia, France, England and America. What he has to say is brisk, terse and extremely informative.

"Some of his suggestions include, 'One should read something every day; 'One must be persistent in reading,' and 'A frequent reference to dictionaries in order to get the precise meaning of words is also indispensable.'

"This reviewer must admit that he has not read all the novels listed, but only one of the titles was unknown to him. Generally, the book selected to represent an author is a well-thought-out introduction to the writer's work.

"The person who reads only a few selections of the novels mentioned will discover the beginning of an adventure that will lead him from

book to book. The person who will not attempt even one of the suggested books is a loser indeed."

The "Portfolio" also features an article entitled "Un Petit Morceau de Paris in Pennsylvania" in which Laidley, a resident of Carmichaels, relates how he first became interested in books and reading as a child and how he gradually has constituted a personal library, both in France and in the United States, that now includes a great portion of the most representative titles of world literature.

The "Portfolio" is published by the Dauphin County Library System at Harrisburg for the purpose of encouraging the use of libraries for the promotion of a more widespread interest in reading and for bringing attention to the writings of Pennsylvania authors. It is distributed to all public libraries in the state, where it is available for inspection.

Carmichaels Hires Solicitor, OKs Purchase Of Patrol Car

CARMICHAELS — Carmichaels Borough Council, in a meeting that had been postponed from last week for lack of a quorum, carried on business Monday night with four of the seven members present.

Council members agreed to hire the firm of Sayers, King, Keener and

Natiltz of Waynesburg as borough solicitor for \$50 an hour. They also gave permission to the police to choose and purchase a used police car at a cost of under \$4,000.

Council also approved contracting with Chester Engineers of Pittsburgh to conduct a review of storm drainage and sidewalk problems at a cost of \$900. This review is necessary before any grants for such work can be made.

Council also agreed to a request from the Carmichaels Chamber of Commerce to provide free parking in the borough on Aug. 22, 23, and 24 for a sidewalk sale. The chamber will reimburse the borough \$50 per day for the free parking.

Chamber of Commerce President John Brodak also asked council to consider ways of solving a parking problem in front of Sam's Gym on South Street. The owner, Sam Miller, had asked the chamber to help with the problem which developed when council removed two parking meters from in front of his business, turning it into a no parking zone.

Brodak suggested one solution

might be making South Street into a one-way street. However, Council President Betty Morris said council had no authority to do that since South Street is a state road. She also said that the former parking spaces where in violation of the borough traffic ordinance which requires parking spaces of approximately eight by 22 feet.

Council member Greg Pecon made a motion that the meters be put back with cars to be ticketed if they extend onto the road and that the no parking signs be removed pending the advice of the solicitor. Mrs. Morris said the suggestion would require an amendment to the traffic ordinance and, because she abstained from voting since she is related to Miller, the motion did not pass.

Alfred Smalara asked that repair work be done on Maple Alley between Greene and George streets and that a mirror be installed on a blind corner on the alley. His request was referred to the Street Chairman Betty Hudson.

Neighboring property owners to a building on North Market Street which houses the Church of the Wilderness attended the meeting to complain about the condition of the building. They said that the building is filled with bats, is in a rundown condition and a fire hazard. Council agreed to investigate the problem and speak with the property owner. Mrs. Morris said the mayor would enforce the nuisance ordinance if necessary.

Council set the borough cleanup day for Saturday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Stephen McCann asked that public support be given to the appeal by the King Coal Association for residents to clean up properties in the borough and cut grass around curbs in preparation for the annual State Bituminous Coal Show, which begins Aug. 18.

Hospital Furloughs 46 People

WAYNESBURG — Greene County Memorial Hospital, citing seasonal low occupancy, has furloughed 46 employees effective at 7 a.m. Tuesday, according to hospital Administrator Michael Flinn.

Furloughs will be for an indefinite period and employees will not be called back until there is a substantial and sustained increase in patient population, Flinn said.

Because many of the furloughed employees were working on a part-time basis, the layoff translates into 36 full-time positions. The hospital, prior to the recent layoff, had 369 full-time positions.

Many departments are affected by the layoffs, including nursing service, laundry, maintenance, housekeeping, radiology, laboratory and IV therapy. However, Flinn said, patient care will not be affected by the layoffs.

Greene County Memorial, currently undergoing major renovation and expansion, has 120 beds and 11 bassinets.

New Trial Denied On DUI Charge

WAYNESBURG — Greene County Court has refused to grant a new trial to Hallie McCollum of Holbrook R.D.1, who was convicted in March on a charge of driving while intoxicated.

McCollum was directed to be in court on Aug. 24 for sentencing. He currently is in Greene County jail serving a sentence for a separate incident of driving while intoxicated and homicide by vehicle.

McCollum was first arrested for drunk driving on March 29, 1982, and was subsequently admitted to the ARD program. He was still on ARD probation when he was involved in an accident on Dec. 10, 1982, which resulted in charges of homicide by vehicle and drunken driving, to which he pleaded guilty.

Following the second arrest, his ARD probation on the earlier charge was revoked and he stood trial, with the jury returning a guilty verdict on March 7, 1984.

The focal point of the new trial petition was the contention that the court committed fundamental error in not holding a hearing on a pre-trial motion which sought the right to inspect the breath-testing machine and related records.

In response, the court noted that the intoxilyzer machine and records from its use were no longer available by the time the trial was held, and the intoxilyzer reading was not offered or used in evidence against the defendant at the trial.

Spillway Bids Are Accepted

JEFFERSON — Port Vue Plumbing Co. of Allegheny County is the apparent low bidder for spillway improvement at Wisecarver Dam near Waynesburg, according to the Southwestern Pennsylvania Water Authority.

The authority accepted the bids during a meeting this week in Jefferson.

Bids ranged from Port Vue's \$174,000 to \$235,000 from Carmen Paliotta Construction Co. Other bids included Penowa General Construction of Avella, \$230,000; Alec Parris Construction, \$194,200 and Sarviello Construction of Pittsburgh, \$198,279.

Wisecarver Dam was cited following a national dam inspection program in 1979 as having a "seriously inadequate" spillway.

Joseph Simatic, authority manager, says the dam is not in a dangerous condition but the authority will comply with a state Department of Environmental Resources directive.

The dam was constructed in 1931 and current criteria for determining spillway adequacy was changed after 1970.

All bids are being studied by the authority's engineer prior to any award being made.

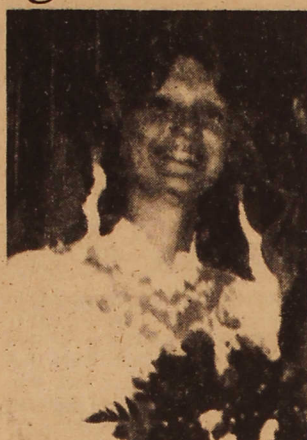

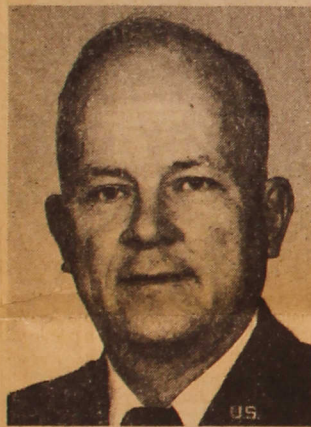
2 Nemaacolin Houses To Be Demolished
