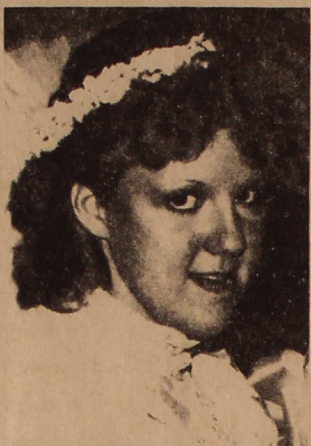

Clutter Family Maintains Its Reign Over Lamb Contest At County Fair

WAYNESBURG — For the third consecutive year, the Clutter family from Prosperity has won the annual lamb carcass contest at the Greene County Fair.

Sponsored by the Greene County Sheep & Wool Growers Association, the third annual competition included the showing of 18 lambs.

The 1985 champion carcass lamb was shown by Crystal Clutter. It marked the third year the Clutter family won top prize, and they had the reserve champion as well in 1983.

Tom Brookover of Mt. Morris showed this year's reserve champion. The Brookover family has been showing registered Suffolk sheep and

Polled Hereford cattle for several years.

The show is designed to provide producers with information on the quality of lamb they are marketing. Bob Calvert, Mercer County extension agent, evaluated the lambs on foot. He placed the top five lambs in the class and assigned live scores to each lamb with 100 being a perfect score.

Bill Henning, extension meat specialist, evaluated the lambs on the rail at Loutsion Packing Co. in Canonsburg.

Dr. Henning placed a conformation score and leg score on each lamb.

He also estimated the percent kidney, pelvic and heart fat, and measured the backfat thickness and rib eye area. This data, plus the live score, live weight and carcass weight, were put into a computer program which combined all scores into one index score.

The index was then used to make the final placing.

Other live placings were: Marcia Belding, second; Tom Brookover, third; Valerie Kerr, fourth; and Keith Scott, fifth.

Final carcass placings, other than champions, were Keith Scott, third; Valerie Kerr, fourth; and Carla Clutter, fifth.

Greensboro Girl Shows Champion

WAYNESBURG — Eight-year-old Jamie Cowell of Waynesburg, Greensboro Star Route, showed the grand champion steer in the 4-H Market Steer competition at the Greene County Fair Wednesday, Aug. 7. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Cowell.

Although Jamie could be described as small, being well under 4-feet tall and thin, she showed her determination in the competition several times by mastering her 1,154-pound Chi-Angus crossbreed, which at times seemed to show it had a mind of its own. The steer had been chosen as the champion middleweight.

This is the first year Jamie has competed in the event, and winning brought more than a few tears to her eyes. Her father, however, insisted the competition was a lot harder on him.

"It's been a long day," said Cowell. "It's a lot easier being a kid than being a parent." He said that during the judging, "my heart was pounding."

Jamie is a fourth grade student at Penn Pitt Elementary School. On Tuesday, she had also showed the grand champion Simmental heifer and reserve Simmental heifer in the beef breeding competition.

Showing the reserve grand champion in the Market Steer competition was Jessica Andrew, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Andrew of Nineveh R.D.1. Her steer, a cross between a Simmental and a Limousin, weighed 1,194 pounds and was the champion heavyweight.

The Market Steer competition drew a large crowd to the show ring in the livestock building. The judge was William Henning, an extension, livestock and meat specialist from Pennsylvania State University.

The champion in the lightweight division was a 1,060-pound steer shown by Kristen Pettit, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Pettit of Sycamore R.D.1. Shawn Shimek, son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Shimek of Waynesburg R.D.1, showed the reserve lightweight champion. His steer weighed 958 pounds.

The reserve champion of the middleweight division was shown by Jamie Henry, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Henry of Sycamore R.D.1. Her steer weighed 1,112 pounds.

The reserve champion of the heavyweight division was a 1,294-pound steer shown by Troy Conner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Randy Conner of Waynesburg R.D.3.

Brian Eisiminger, son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Eisiminger of Waynesburg R.D.3, won the rate of gain trophy with a 1,338-pound steer. The steer had weighed only 792 pounds at the end of November 1984.

The 43 steers entered in the competition as well as the 58 lambs entered in the Market Lamb competition held Tuesday were sold to the highest bidder at an auction at 6:30 p.m. Thursday.

Local merchants will have an opportunity to purchase their own signs to be placed along side the welcome

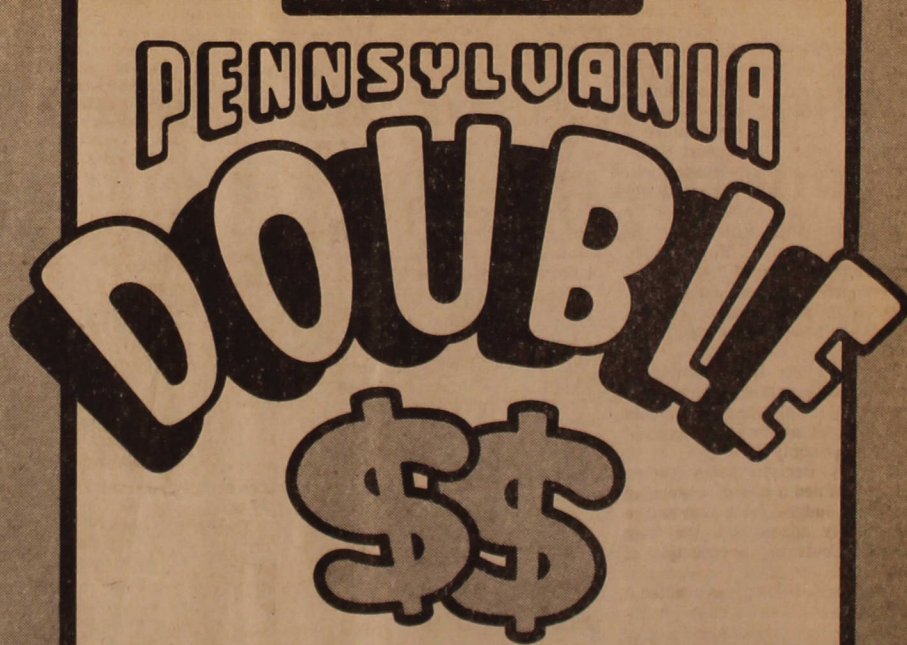
banners. Volunteers are still needed for various tasks related to the coal show and those interested are asked to call Jim Clovis at 966-2839.

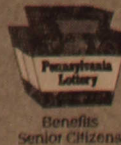

Dental Microdots Protect Children

WAYNESBURG — Carrie and Tommy Gray carry with them a piece of identification they cannot lose. In the event they should get lost or, worse, be abducted, the children can be identified by a tiny dot on one of their back teeth.

In the wake of nationwide publicity about missing children, dental microdots are the latest thing being manufactured to protect youngsters.

Made of soft plastic or stainless steel, the dots are bonded to a back tooth and last up to six years.

Carrie, who is 8, and Tommy, 7, had the microdots bonded to their teeth recently by Waynesburg dentist Ingrid Schmidt. The procedure took less than 15 minutes and no anesthesia was required.

Their mother, Denise Gray, said she learned of the program from a television show. "I think it's a really good idea," she said. "It's scary anymore," she added, referring to the growing number of missing children.

Mrs. Gray and her husband earlier explained to their son and daughter what the dots on their teeth would be for and, should they ever be lost, how to use them to get home. "They were looking forward to having it done," she said.

The microdots contain each child's Social Security number. They are bonded on the front of a back tooth with a liquid plastic. They cannot be seen when the child speaks or smiles but can easily be checked to see if they are in place.

There are about five companies which now manufacture the microdots. The one Mrs. Gray contacted is I.D. Dots Inc. of Hinsdale, Ill. For \$15 she received a microdot with a social security number on it, as well as a spare dot. The company maintains a toll-free number and a computer bank which can match the number with the child's name, address, hair and eye color, birth date and emergency contacts including a physician or dentist.

The dots are about one-eighth of an inch in diameter and the number can be read without magnification. Other companies provide dots which contain several pieces of information but must be magnified to be read.

Because teeth are so long-lasting they have often been the final element

used for identification purposes. Ironically, however, because of improved oral hygiene, today's children often do not have many cavities, making it difficult to identify them through their dental charts.

Dr. Schmidt noted the microdots could also be invaluable to adults, and the companies which manufacture them do note that older people, especially those with medical problems or joggers who don't normally carry identification with them on a run, should consider the procedure.

Dr. Schmidt is offering to do the bonding procedure free of charge to parents who have purchased a microdot for their child. She also has forms in her office that can be used to obtain the microdots.

Court Suspends Local Lawyer

WAYNESBURG — Attorney Robert D. Berryman, 33, of Waynesburg R.D.3 has been suspended from practice, according to an order handed down by the Pennsylvania Supreme Court.

The order, signed by Patrick Tassos, deputy prothonotary of the state Supreme Court, cited the reason as "having been convicted in the Court of Common Pleas of Greene County of the offense of intentional possession of a controlled substance."

According to Tassos, the matter has been referred to the Disciplinary Board of the Supreme Court which will review the record and make a recommendation to the court to determine the length of the suspension.

Berryman was arrested by Waynesburg Borough Police on July 19, 1984, and charged with 15 counts of possession of cocaine. He was then arrested on November 2, 1984, and charged with criminal conspiracy, racketeering, possession of cocaine and possession of cocaine with intent to deliver.

Early this year, he pleaded guilty to possession as part of a plea bargain arrangement and was sentenced to five and a half months to five years in the Greene County Jail.

However, Berryman was granted and then denied a stay of sentencing by visiting Judge John Adams and he immediately appealed to the state Superior Court for a reduction of sentencing.

The Superior Court has granted a stay until a full hearing can be held.

District May Escape EPA Fine

HARRISBURG — A representative of the Southeastern Greene School District said he believes the district will not have to pay the entire \$12,000 fine the Environmental Protection Agency threatened to impose after the district failed to submit a report on asbestos in its schools.

Representatives of the school district met with EPA officials Friday morning in Philadelphia to discuss the agency's charges. EPA had accused the school district of failing to complete the required inspection for asbestos.

Although the district had completed the inspection in April, the

report on the findings had never been sent to the agency.

"The EPA understands that there was no intention on the board's part or the district's part to not comply" with the law, said district solicitor John Stets.

The fine, said Stets, "if it exists at all will be very nominal, or a token fine." He added that EPA officials were satisfied that the district had done everything required of it to comply with the law.

The school district had filed a formal answer to the EPA charges earlier in the week. Four representatives — Mark Brozik, a board member and acting business manager, Superintendent Charles Wyda, Stets

and Board President George Biletz — drove to Philadelphia to meet with the EPA.

The district will now have to wait for the agency to make a decision on the case, said Stets.

The district was charged with failure to comply with rules for asbestos in schools, which are part of the Toxic Substance Control Act. Under the act, each district must inspect its schools for the presence of asbestos.

If there is asbestos, which might pollute the air, employees, students and parents must be informed about it. If the problem is severe, work might have to be done to cover it or remove it.

The inspection of buildings in Southeastern Greene showed that only a minor amount of asbestos was present in the basement corridor and boiler room of the high school. The district had notified employees, and intends to notify students when they return to school. The asbestos, however, was not severe enough to require immediate removal.

Clerk-Of-Courts Vacancy County Position Filled

WAYNESBURG — Gov. Dick Thornburgh has appointed Shirley Stockdale of Waynesburg as Greene County clerk of courts to fill the vacancy created on May 10 by the death of Al Darney of Carmichaels.

The appointment was made to fill within the 90-day period in which the governor could appoint to fill the vacancy. It will not be effective, however, until confirmed by the State Senate, which is expected to act on the appointment when it returns from recess in September.

Because of a recent change in the county code, Mrs. Stockdale's appointment will run only through this year. The final two years of Darney's term will be filled by a person elected as part of the municipal election on Nov. 5.

Because Darney's death occurred after it was too late to nominate candidates in the primary election on May 24, both the Democratic and Republican county committees will nominate candidates to run for the office in November.

The Democratic committee has announced it will select its candidate

next Monday. The Republican committee has not announced when it will make its choice.

Mrs. Stockdale, who has been a deputy in the clerk of courts office since 1968 and chief deputy since 1980, is one of three persons reported to be seeking the Democratic nomination.

More Liquid Fuels Tax Allocations Are Available

HARRISBURG — Pennsylvania's 2,572 local governments will receive an additional \$4.6 million in liquid fuels tax allocations being distributed in August by the Department of Transportation.

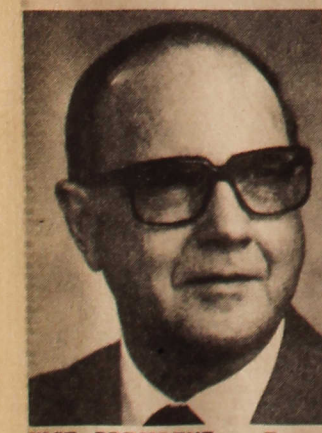
The announcement was made by Secretary Thomas D. Larson. Greene County, which received an April 1985 payment of \$1,280,796, will receive an additional \$37,967 this month. The supplemental payment, Larson said, is the result of higher than anticipated liquid fuels tax receipts during fiscal year 1983-84.

"Millions of dollars of highway and bridge maintenance and construction projects will be possible again this year because of the Commonwealth's annual distribution of liquid fuels tax funds," said Larson. "Local governments are continuing to follow our 'maintenance first' policy, and 90 percent of the money currently allocated is being used to maintain the 68,000 miles of highways belonging to local municipalities."

Local governments receive approximately 20 percent of the revenues from the Oil Franchise Tax, as well as 20 percent of the revenues from the state's 12 cents per gallon liquid fuels tax. The allocation of these monies from the Motor License Fund is based on miles of roads and population in a municipality.

The donation from the borough was made at least three years ago when council abolished a parks and recreation fund and donated money in the fund to the park.

Mrs. Hudson also reported that a damaged drain, which had caused flooding on North Market Street, had been repaired at a cost of \$450. The cost included labor and a grate.

State Police Are On Lookout For Drunken Drivers

After halting the procedure for about a year, Pennsylvania State Police will once again be setting up checkpoints to look for drunken drivers.

Tom Lyon, spokesman for the state police in Harrisburg, said the sobriety checkpoints were stopped last year when their legality was questioned in Chester County.

"The judge said there's nothing in the law that says you can, and state police said there's nothing that says you can't," Lyon said.

Clarifying this was a law that will go into effect Aug. 19 authorizing police to pull over a certain number of cars to look for intoxicated drivers.

"We're coming back with them, and we're coming back with a big sign. We want the public to understand what that sign means. The checks are usually done in darkness, and it can be scary. The sign will tell them why they're being stopped."

Troopers will be looking for the odor of alcohol and slurred speech and appearance and behavior associated with intoxication.

Sgt. Roger Waters at the state police barracks in Washington said he received the regulations governing the checkpoints in May. He said signs must be posted a certain number of feet before the checkpoint. On a road with a 55 mph speed limit, for example, the sign must be 550 feet before the check.

Two troopers or a trooper and a supervisor will man the checkpoints, Waters said. The signs will be placed so the police can see anyone making a U-turn to avoid the check.

Library To Show Collection Of Smithsonian Photographs

CARMICHAELS — "Perfect In Her Place," an exhibition of photographs from the Smithsonian Institution, will open at the Flenniken Library in Carmichaels on Monday, Aug. 19.

The exhibit will be open for free public viewing during regular library hours until Sept. 14.

Sponsored by the Greene County Council on the Arts, the exhibit is part of the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service. It depicts the history of women in the labor force from the 19th century through World War I.

Included are photographs of women at work in early textile mills, the U.S. Mint, the printing trades, the shoe and clothing industries, early telephone operators, and many other fields. The photographs are accompanied by explanatory texts.

The exhibit at Flenniken will also include a collection of tools used by women, beginning with churns, candle molds and washboards and leading to more technical equipment.

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Gubernatorial Candidate Starts Early, Visits Greene County

WAYNESBURG — Jules Patt is getting an early start.

With less statewide name recognition and political background than other potential candidates, he has been traveling through Pennsylvania since March 11 when he announced that he is running for the Democratic nomination for governor in 1986.

The 42-year-old Hollidaysburg businessman visited Fayette and Greene counties recently as part of that "pre-campaign." At Waynesburg he met with Democratic chairman Jim Harris, the county commissioners, UMW people and other officials.

"I'm certainly not looking for endorsements at this stage, but they seemed receptive to my goals and programs for the state," he said in an interview.

Although he is an attorney, Patt's main interest is business, not law.

He is president of The Patt Organization Inc., which has developed \$150 million worth of real estate projects in six states. He is also president of Carter Management Company, of Quality Builders and Supplies Inc. and American City Planning & Design Inc. He is managing general partner of Lake Raystown Resort and chairman of the board of Ralph J. Albarano & Sons. Inc. His companies employ 300 people.

Patt attributes his quick success in business to his ability to identify opportunities and to attract capital, to his

willingness to take prudent risks, and to his skills in creatively managing resources necessary to get the job done. He wants to utilize those skills and strategies to revitalize the economy of Pennsylvania as its next governor.

"To get Pennsylvania moving again on the road to full employment we need someone in Harrisburg who understands what it takes to generate capital development, new business and long-term quality jobs," he said.

He feels the present Thornburgh administration has fallen short in

those areas, and points to the failure of Pennsylvania to land General Motors new Saturn plant as an example of that shortcoming.

"Pennsylvania was never a serious contender for the plant and its 6,000 jobs," he said. "The package that Thornburgh and (Lt. Gov.) Scranton put together for GMC was so naive it was embarrassing. They never sat down with leaders of the steelworkers or auto workers, with banks which have large holdings of GMC stock, with educational leaders or others to work out a strategy for a viable proposal. If they had, the plant might be coming here and not to Tennessee."

Patt said he also disagrees with Scranton's statement that the days of the Pennsylvania steel mill is over. "It is unwise to abandon our old industries in the pursuit of new ones," he said.

Economically speaking, Pennsylvania is a sleeping giant. Not many states are better positioned for new business opportunities. Our state has a highly-skilled, willing and hard-working work force, a wealth of natural resources such as coal, oil and gas, a first-rate system of higher education, a good transportation base, and an ideal location for reaching major markets in the east, mid-west, south and overseas.

"The only missing ingredient is dynamic, determined leadership at the top in government."

Waynesburg Council Votes To Limit Weight On Streets

WAYNESBURG — Waynesburg Borough Council, at its meeting Monday night, Aug. 12, voted to place a five-ton weight limit on nine streets in the borough for a 90-day trial period.

"The purpose is to try to prevent further unnecessary damage to the streets," said Councilman Kenneth Fox. "Some of the streets can't handle heavy loads."

According to the borough ordinance, the weight limit can be placed on the roads for 90 days, which will give residents time to comment on the matter. After that time, council can act to make the weight limit permanent. It was noted that utility and residential deliveries are exempt from the restriction.

The limit will be placed on Balzell Street; Bowlby Street, from Wayne Street to Park Avenue; Braden Street, from Porter Street to Woodland Avenue; Cecil Avenue; Center Avenue; Cumberland Street, from High Street to Greene Street; Liberty Avenue, from High to East Street; Lincoln Street; and Maiden Street, from High to College Street.

Council took the action after a resident had requested that a weight limit be placed on Balzell. The street provides the only access to where a concrete plant is being constructed in Franklin Township by Richard Raymond of Waynesburg R.D.4. The resident said he was opposed to the construction of the plant.

Councilman Frank VanCleve told the man if the borough put the limit only on this road, especially while the concrete plant was being built, the borough might end up in court. Other council members noted, however, that other roads in the borough needed to be protected from heavy trucks.

In other business, Council signed a consent order with the state Department of Environmental Resources.

Under the order, the borough agrees to renovate its sewage treatment plant, a project which will cost about \$2.4 million, Fox said. He added that the borough expects to receive at least 55 percent of the money through federal grants.

Fox said the cost to customers has not been determined, but even if the borough receives all the grant money, sewage bills could still increase by about half of what customers are currently paying.

It was announced by engineer Bruce Chambers that the borough had received a \$75,000 grant from the Department of Commerce for work on the plant. Council voted to hire Chambers to do the work that will be completed with this money.

Council voted to prepare an ordinance which is required to permit the borough police to use a speed detection instrument, known as an excessive speed prevention device on borough streets. It also approved a document on the police department's standard operating procedures.

The police department's operating procedures will not be made public, said VanCleve. "Believe me, we're not trying to hide anything," he said. But some section of the document could lead some people to break the law. As an example, VanCleve said the document may describe when police may enter into a high-speed chase.

Council opened bids for repairing the floor and laying carpet in the borough building, and awarded the contract to Humble and Sons, which submitted a low bid of \$878.

Acting on a request from residents, council voted to make Second Street, between Richhill Street and Morris Street, a no-parking zone. Residents said they had problems getting into their driveways because of cars parked in the alley.

Tax Collector Irks Franklin Officials

WAYNESBURG — Central Tax Bureau, a private tax collecting agency under contract to several local municipalities and school districts, came under fire at the Franklin Township Board of Supervisors meeting Monday, Aug. 12, for investing township money and keeping the interest.

Township officials were notified of the practice following a regular audit of township books by certified public accountant Jim Milinovich.

Township solicitor William Hook, after checking the contract with Central Tax Bureau, said the practice is not mentioned. Hook said the contract does not give Central Tax Bureau permission to invest the money, but added that the contract does not specifically prohibit the practice.

Central Tax Bureau, with headquarters in Pittsburgh, collects the 1 percent earned income tax and \$10 occupational privilege tax for the township. The occupational tax brings the township about \$50,000 annually. The earned income tax realizes about \$300,000 each year, with half going to the Central Greene School District.

Central Tax Bureau receives 3.5 percent of the tax collected.

The township receives a check near the end of each month from Central Tax Bureau, but the check is not necessarily to full amount collected for that month, the supervisors learned. It is money held over from those monthly payments that is being invested, it was reported.

The board voted unanimously to write Central Tax Bureau and request the firm cease the practice immediately and send the township each month to full amount that the firm has collected.

In other action, the board awarded a paving contract to A.C. Moyer Co. for work on Crago and Park Avenues, Locust and Morris streets and Dark Hollow Road. Moyer's bid of \$35,676 was lower than the other bid, which was for \$41,350 from Blacktop Paving Co.

The supervisors reviewed a plan for a new building to be erected by David Hook along Elm Drive. The 75 by 110 foot building will be leased to Emway Resources.
